Members of the Woodcrest Arboretum attended the ArbNet virtual conference which originated at Morton Arboretum in Chicago. ArbNet is the association of arboreta and the accrediting body for arboreta. The Woodcrest Arboretum received a scholarship and gathered as a group to watch the conference presentations. Doug Tallamy from the University of Delaware was the keynote speaker. He lives in Oxford, PA. Here are some things Dr. Tallamy mentioned:

- Non-native plants aren't inherently bad. They may be used as nectar plants for pollinators and for historic, cultural, or esthetic reasons.
- Non-native plants can be extremely invasive.
- Butterflies are the primary pollinators for a great many vegetables & herbs such as celery, lettuce, peas, beans, the cruciferous

- vegetables such as cabbage & broccoli, and the mints which include many popular spices.
- Butterflies come from caterpillars.
- Caterpillars are essential for almost all birds. They need caterpillars to feed their young.
- A unique native plant is essential for almost any caterpillar to complete its life cycle.
- The term native plants means plants native to the area which attract insects already nearby.
- More native plant gardens can create stepping stones for insect and bird species to migrate to new habitats and survive.
- Holes in plant leaves can be a good thing. A beneficial insect may be using the leaf such as a caterpillar or leafroller butterfly.
- Leaf litter is essential for some caterpillars to overwinter. The chrysalises often get rolled up in or are attached to some of the leaves. So please don't disturb leaf litter under native trees in the arboretum until mid-May.
- Most "butterfly garden" plants are nectar plants, and even non-native plants such as Butterfly Bush can be good nectar plants. They usually aren't able to complete any caterpillar's lifecycle to become a butterfly.
- Not all non-native plants are invasive. As examples Crabapple, Flowering Cherry, Redbud, & Ginkgo are not native.
- Some native plants are invasive such as Canada Goldenrod and Common Milkweed.
